PUMS for Principals-Offer

The militant side of me was delighted when late last term the Principals collectively and overwhelmingly rejected the Ministry's offer to settle our Collective Agreement bargaining. I think we are finally (amen) now in a position after being beaten up for years, missing out in previous campaigns and generally feeling a little under valued, that we are collectively prepared to fight. The Ministry has made a new offer which we are set to vote on in the near future. My earnest advice as a crusty old, long serving educator to all principals is that **before** you say yes, you consider:

- Is a \$4000 one off U Grade incentive going to make your lives better? For those of you who are math challenged, \$4000 minus tax isn't \$4000.
- Secondary were offered \$6000. Do they work harder?
- What does the offer look like in regards to the current % increase in inflation?
- Will it factor in inflation over the next three years, as it is realistic to consider once we are done, we can't go back.
- Just because the MOE state that this is their best offer, does this mean we have to accept it.
- Is it worth a little more short term pain and loss, for some longer term affirmation and remediation.

Does the offer make you feel valued or add appeal to the role?

Curriculum Rollout- The Ongoing Saga......

We'd like to to think is most cases that within the MOE most things are planned rationally and carefully. That said, the current curriculum rollout still has me a little perplexed around; the speed of roll out, fractured nature of resource release, the limited access to curriculum advisers (who are amazing), the pause around some of the associated progressions and a general lack of clarity after 3 years of what things **should** look like in schools today. As mentioned in previous rants, we love the intent, focus areas and potential but there seems to be a massive amount of work needing to be done before we see it being effectively actualised in schools.

We were pleased to read the second paragraph pictured below in the recent **Principal Matters** mailing that highlighted how 'ambitious' the current approach was and that as schools **we need to be very mindful of our context, load on our people and carefully consider how we proceed.** Remember we are self governing, we get to choose.

A timely reminder not to get to caught up in to doing everything, as opposed to doing one or two things really well. Hamish and I do feel like hypocrites for waxing on around this, as our teams would probably argue that going slowly and patiently in not our forte.

General statement of focus:



1. Late last term the Ministry of Education appointed new Principal Leaders Liaison Officers to serve as a conduit between schools and the Ministry. These individuals will support principals across the motu sound off, rant, seek clarity and generally assist us to navigate the turbulent waters we face. It is important to note that all the appointments are current, experienced principals with cool heads and great connections.

The Waikato is very lucky in that Nesan Govender has been appointed to assist. 2. MOE Emergency Fund -Storm Damage

It is worth noting that the MOE team in the Waikato have set up an emergency fund that can be accessed fairly quickly to address immediate needs. This fund can be sourced in negotiation with your MOE Property Adviser and the process is not arduous. I have talked to several principals who have waxed on about receiving and an initial \$2000, quickly followed by another \$10,000. This is a great step from the MOE, as most of you will be aware this would normally fall under R&M or insurance.
